POTENTATE'S MESSAGE

The 136th Imperial session in Toronto, Ontario, Canada of Shriners International is complete and our international status grew by two Temples, one in the Philippines



and one in Puerto Rico. We also voted to allow Heidelberg Germany to work toward getting enough members to form a Temple in Europe (probably only the first of several). It was exciting for all of us to see. Speaking of all, the Al Kaly group included Ill. Sir Billy & Lady Leah Thornburg (about their 20th straight year), Ill. Sir Bob & Lady Betty Burr, Ill. Sir Dave & Lady Maddy Stevens, Ill. Sir Tom Holmes, CR Allan Ake & Lady Linda, AR Gary & Lady Donna Sears as well as Lady Deborah and I. The official number of Shriners world wide was given as 340,048 on June 30, 2010. That tells me we need to get busy finding members for both Al Kaly and the Shrine in general.

Of course this session happened during one of the

hottest periods in recent memory and while it slowed yours truly down a bit, it didn't stop the Queen of England from making her rounds of Toronto. While she didn't pop in on our meeting, Imperial Sir Jack Jones did go to dinner with her (OK maybe not exactly with her but he was at the dinner).

Most of the legislation was simple "housekeeping" issues that didn't stir up much debate. Our Hospital report gave us the news that while we are still operating at a deficit, it's not as bad as it was. We are now billing third parties, normally insurance, but there is still no cost to the patient or family. The actual billing process started about the end of June and only a few hospitals have been involved so far, but it has started and estimates call for it to reach almost \$175 million per year once we are fully implemented. All of our hospitals are working at doing things smarter to save money. The adopted hospital budget for 2011 is \$732 million or about \$58 million more than this year. One criticism brought up from the floor was that we are continuing to build replacement hospitals when we already have excess capacity and don't have the money without dipping into our investment principle. That question wasn't answered well in my opinion.

Hope to see you all at the parades in Rocky Ford, Lamar, Cripple Creek and the Temple Picnic this month.

Featured Member III. Sir Les Tedrow

As the wind and waves crashed around the destroyer, he wasn't sure if he would survive.

"We got into one of the biggest typhoons at that time," said Past Potentate, Ill. Sir Les Tedrow. "We had winds of (more than) 170 miles per hour. Rather than staying in Okinawa, we had to head directly into the center of the

storm. It took 20 plates off of our ship." But after being bounced around in the waves and the wind, the destroyer finally arrived in Japan, where it

> had to go into dry dock. Born January 17, 1928 in Pueblo, Tedrow graduated from Central High School before heading into the Navy in June 1946. "Our whole class was drafted into either the Army or the Navy," he said.

After attending the Tome Institute of Technology, Tedrow was assigned in 1947 to the USS Furse, where he served in the combat information center as a radar and sonar technician. After he was honorably discharged, he came back to Colorado, where he graduated from the University of Denver with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry.

From there, Tedrow worked a short time for the Colorado Fuel and Iron prior to joining the staff of Mobile Oil Corporation in 1953. At this point, he was transferred into the industrial sales department in the Kansas City office, where he covered Montana, North and South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming



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and several other states before he was transferred to the Twin Cities in the Minneapolis division. Along the way, he was promoted to chief engineer in Cleveland, Ohio, and then transferred to New York City, N.Y., working as project engineer.

In this position, Tedrow said he had the privilege of helping to develop synthetic oil, including Mobile One and many industrial synthetics, as well as doing research on the lubrication process. "Mobile was probably the leader in synthetics," Tedrow said. After working for 32 years with Mobile, he retired and moved back to Pueblo.

His involvement with the Masonic bodies began when he joined the Pueblo Lodge No. 17, as a 21st birthday present, after completing his service in the military. "I've been a Mason for more than 60 years," Tedrow said. "My dad and my brothers were members." After he retired, he went into the Scottish Rite Consistory then became a member of the Al Kaly Shrine.

Along the way, he has been active in all three Masonic Bodies. As a Mason, he went through the chairs, becoming Master of the Lodge in 1994. Also, he went through the chairs of the Al Kaly Shrine and served as Potentate of Al Kaly Shrine in 1999. "Before I became Potentate, I was also on the Board of Governors for the

Shrine Hospital in Salt Lake City for nine years," Tedrow said.


As Potentate, he headed up building the storage unit at the Pueblo Shrine Club. According to Tedrow, "The purpose of this was to bring in income for the Pueblo

Shrine Club to keep it going." Currently, he serves on the board of the Shrine Club and as Treasurer of the Scottish Rite and Pueblo Lodge

No. 17, as well as being the 14th Degree Master in Scottish Rite. Also, he is a member of the Al Kaly Mule Train. He also served as Commander of the

York Rite for three years, but gave up that chair in June of this year.

"Even though I had a lot of fun being the Potentate, I think the best job I've had with the Masons is being Master of the Lodge," Tedrow said.

He met his Lady Martha at Pueblo Junior College and they were married for 55 years at the time of her passing. "She was a great help in everything that I did," Tedrow said. "I don't how I would have gotten along without her." He has a son, who lives in Ohio, and a daughter, who lives in Broomfield. He also has six grandchildren.

In his leisure, Les worked in wood, making numerous pieces of furniture, clocks and other items.

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



MORE SHRINE CENTERS, FEWER MEMBERS

In Ill. Sir Steve's article, he references the fact that two additional Shrine Temples were approved and a third given the go-ahead to proceed at the recent Imperial Session. He also states that Shrine membership is at 340,048 members as of June 30, 2010. This interesting contradiction – more Shrine Temples and fewer members – tells us that declining membership is still a major concern and as such, is a critical issue to our Fraternity.

We have been given a great new membership tool to help with this problem: the Virtual Mentor Program (VMP). The goal of the VMP is to pair experienced Shriners with interested men. The initial contact is generated via the new website, www.beashrinernow.com. If a member logs on to the website and simply browses, there is no contact generated. If he is interested in finding out how to be a Mason and Shriner, he will be asked to fill out a questionnaire. Data gathered from the questionnaire will be used to pair the interested individual with a Virtual Mentor Shriner with similar interests and background. The Shriner and potential candidate then communicate and the Shriner (Virtual Mentor) advises and counsels the candidate about Masonry and Shriners International.

You will be surprised who pulls their dues card from their wallet and gasps when it says 2009.

We've completed the 1st half of 2010, and as I promised, my article this month is on our mid-year financial status.

I'm pleased to be able to report that in the general fund, we are tracking very close to what we've budgeted for the year. I extend my heartfelt thanks to all who've assisted with all of the activities so far this year. We currently show a net operating surplus of \$35,427. While this may seem that we're doing very well, the fact is that Al Kaly generates nearly 65% of our income in the first six months of the year, but over 53% of our expenses occur in the last half of the year. The bottom line is that we are on-track to finish the year slightly in the black, but we need our upcoming fundraisers this year to be successful to meet our goals.

In the transportation fund, our expenses have exceeded our income by about \$8,700. The good news here is that we've spent almost \$20,000 getting our patients to the various Shriners Hospitals. We've also spent nearly \$2,400 for the telemedicine clinics. This is important, as 12 to 15 patients can be seen in a single day at the telemedicine clinics for follow-up appointments that would otherwise require the parents to take a couple days off from work to go to Salt Lake City. Each of those patients would most likely require travel assistance, so you can see we could easily be spending over \$4,000 in travel costs for the kids seen at a single telemedicine clinic. We're doing a great job of helping the children of our communities! Keep it up!

Our Central States host requirements were completed, and all of the final bills have come in for the CSSA business meeting. We completed the business meetings with an operating surplus of \$906. Good work on the part of the CSSA Past President Ill. Sir Dave Stevens, and all those who helped put the meetings together.

I'm looking forward to a great time the remainder of this summer and through the fall.

Those of you that attend stated meetings have heard the Treasurer say that our dues are to cover the operating expenses of



Al Kaly Shriners. Last year's proposed dues increase was designed to do that. When the increase was defeated, it meant that we had to look at other sources of revenue to meet operating expenses. One source we have come to rely heavily upon is the annual raffle.

Proceeds from the raffle are kept in a separate account and can only be spent for the benefit of the entire nobility. This money cannot be spent on an Al Kaly function that would only be benefiting a select group of our members. Raffle proceed money is used to pay office rent, phones, office equipment and maintenance. We will also use this money to fund the annual picnic since it is for the benefit of the nobility. We would never use the money to cover conference/seminar expenses for a Board member as it is not a benefit (at least short term) to the entire nobility. Ouarterly, I send a report of expenses from this account to the State, so we are closely watched.

Because of its importance to the operation of Al Kaly, I have personally taken on the raffle. This year, Ill. Sir Bob Burr and I went shopping to get the best deal on prizes that we could. This year's prizes are of top quality and we hope that when you received your tickets, you noticed this.

The purpose of this article is to ask for your support of the raffle, remembering that it benefits Al Kaly Shriners and now that it is used to help cover operating expenses, we don't have to pull money from our reserve funds to keep us afloat. The cost has been reduced to \$20 per ticket or six for \$100.00. It is our hope that if you can't take advantage of the six ticket deal that you will be able to purchase one ticket. After all, it only takes one to win.

I have plenty of tickets available in the Office for sale and they will be available for purchase at the picnic, prior to the drawing. Another plus is the money you spend on tickets is classified as a donation to the temple for merit points. So, a person purchasing six tickets for \$100 gets a cool 100 points. Support the raffle!



Cindy was born in Limon, Colorado and moved to Colorado Springs at a very early age.


When fitted with a Fez and Collar, she became a hit at all the Parades. Cindy




This saga began in the fall of 2009 when I was invited to participate in the Raising of a brother from a sister Lodge. Bro. Sergio Motter was leaving for the Middle East and his home Lodge wanted to raise him before his departure. Four Lodges were going to come together at Monument Centurion Lodge No. 195 and do a courtesy degree. After the meeting, I was talking with Sergio and learned that he was born in Italy, had lived in Venezuela for a time and now made his home in the Pueblo area. When I indicated that I would be traveling to Ecuador in March 2010, he indicated that he had a colleague, Carlos Tejada,

from Quito who he would be joining shortly. As it turned out, Carlos Tejada contacted me to advise me that his home Lodge was Jose Mejia Lequerica No. 35 in Quito, Ecuador and that he would contact his Lodge to see if they would be meeting while I was in Quito. After a couple of Emails with Carlos, I was contacted by Victor Hugo Donoso from Quito who informed me that he would be my Masonic Ambassador in Ecuador during my visit.

As the time grew closer for our trip, Victor

Hugo communicated to me that he planned to meet my wife and me at the Quito airport upon our arrival and take us to our hotel. On Sunday evening, March 7, 2010, Edee and I arrived in Quito, Ecuador at a little after 10:00 PM in the evening. After going through the normal Immigration and Customs formalities, we made our way out into the Terminal where a large group of friends and families members eagerly awaited the new arrivals. Many were holding signs for different hotels, cruise lines, etc., but in the back there was a large sign that read "STEVE & EDEE". It was Victor Hugo. He greeted me warmly like a long lost brother and gave Edee a big hug. We then proceeded to his car that we filled up with our bags and then proceeded to our hotel, some 20 minutes away. On the short trip to the La Carolina Hotel, Victor Hugo detailed the plans that he had made for us during the week in Quito. As it turned out, Victor Hugo is the Secretary of the Grand Lodge, Northern District of Ecuador. Before leaving the hotel that evening, he invited us to see the Equatorial Monument and the old city of Quito the next day and in the evening, I was invited to attend his Lodge at 7:30 PM.

That first Monday was a blur as we did a lot of sightseeing in the old colonial city of Quito and the Equatorial Monument, Mitad del Mundo. Quito is an

spring with daytime temperatures in the mid to upper 70 degrees F. and night time in the lower 60 degrees F.

On that first evening, I attended Jose Mejia Lequerica Lodge No. 35. Their Worshipful Master, J. Javier Villalba V. insisted that I sit in the East with him, which was an unexpected honor for me. Although all of the Stations in their Lodge are exactly the same as here in Colorado, the Places are arranged slightly differently. After the normal ritualistic opening of the Lodge (in Spanish, of course) they conducted some business and then had two brothers return proficiencies. This is where things there are very different. The two brothers returning their M.M. *(continued on page 17)*

proficiencies did so individually, but not from memory. They were required to write an essay of about 20 to 25 minutes in length and read their essay in open Lodge. The essays were a detailed explanation of the symbology and lessons that were learned in the degree. Other differences that I observed: 1.) The Lodges do not do ritual from memory, rather all officers read from their Clear Text books; 2.) When the Wardens (1st and 2nd Vigilantes) stand to address the Master (Venerable Maestro) instead of saluting the V.'.M.'. as we do, they stand and hold their gavel in the right hand over the left breast before speaking. There were several other minor differences, but as I was drinking from a fire hose that evening, they have slipped my mind. After the Lodge was closed, we adjourned to refreshment - red wine and finger sandwiches. At this point, Victor Hugo invited the entire Lodge and their wives to a reception on the next Saturday afternoon at his home for Edee and me.

The rest of the week went by all too quickly and when Saturday, March 13th arrived, Edee and I had been treated to a fantastic week in Quito and the high lake country north of Quito with Victor Hugo being the most attentive host that anyone could have asked for. At this point, I must tell you that Victor Hugo does not speak English, although his wife, Carmen and son, Juan Sebastian do. Although my Spanish, from studying at the National University of Mexico in 1960 was a bit rusty, it served me well and much of it came back to me. The unmistaken communication was that of friendship and brotherly love.

On Saturday, Victor Hugo picked Edee and me up at our hotel and we drove to his home where his entire Lodge, their wives AND the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Jorge Riofrio and the Most Worshipful Deputy Grand Master and their wives were waiting for us, nearly 30 people in all. Many of the Brothers do speak English as well as many to their wives. The BBQ, drinks and comradeship were fantastic and we were made to feel like we were special visitors. It is hard to put into words the feelings that we had by being able to share our Masonic connection in a far away land.

The second week in Ecuador, we spent cruising in the Galapagos Islands on the 90 passenger Celebrity Xpetition Cruise Ship that was a dream that Edee and I have had for a long time.

The third week, we spent 4 days in the Ecuadorian Amazonia along the Napo River with the Anuangu Kicha Indians at their Napo Wildlife Center. The Napo River is a tributary of the Amazon River and the headwaters of the Napo River start in the glaciers of the Andes just east of



Bro. Javier Ruales and his wife Marta joined us for coffee on the last evening of our time in Quito and invited us to come back soon. I explained to Javier that it was our custom that he and Marta would have to come visit us before we could return to Ecuador. I expect to see Victor Hugo & Carmen, Javier & Marta and perhaps some of the other Brothers here in Colorado over the next few years. My hope is that we here in Colorado can show the same hospitality, brotherly love and genuine friendship that was my distinct honor to receive while in Ecuador.

Without question, I have received a Master's Wages throughout my journey through Masonry and my life is all the richer for these experiences. Since becoming a Master Mason in 1972, I have had the privilege of visiting MacArthur Lodge No. 183 in Seoul, Korea in 1972 and St. Alban's Lodge No. 4 in London, U.K. in 1978 as well as many Lodges in the United States. I encourage every Brother to carry our Colorado Light in Masonry to whatever corner of the world that you may be traveling in. I particularly want to thank one of our newest Brothers, Sergio Motter of Pueblo No. 13 for making the connections for me to have had such a fantastic Masonic experience in Ecuador.





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Some of the sites also have cabins or on-site campers available for rent, so if you would like to be part of these fun events, but do not like camping, get a cabin. Several of




us did last year at Mountaindale campgrounds and loved it.
