POTENTATE'S MESSAGE

The 2011 Central States Shrine Association (CSSA) midwinter meeting was held in Lincoln, Nebraska on April 9-10. The three Al Kaly voting delegates



attended. Ill. Sir Allan Ake, Chief Rabban Gary Sears, and High Priest and Prophet Merv Terrill who was proxied by Assistant Rabban Roger Mendenhall, who couldn't be there. First Lady Linda Agresta and Lady Glenda Terrill were there to represent the Al Kaly Ladies.

Per tradition, there were counterpart gatherings and socials on Thursday night. It was nice to renew acquaintances and friendships among our counterpart groups. Friday brought the opening session and quite a full agenda of business items to take care of. Shriners International (Imperial) officers Mike Severe and Jeff Sowder were there to give the delegates information about the hospitals, some of which follows.

Nobles and Ladies, as you know, the hospitals now are able to accept third party billing (insurance) payments. Since inception, the third party billing program has collected \$12.232 million dollars. Out of that, there was a one-time capital expenditure of \$4.186 million plus operating expenses of \$7.794 million leaving net revenues of \$252,000.

When the dust settles, we expect a revenue stream of \$60 million to \$100 million dollars per year from third party payments. However, we are currently depleting our endowment fund by \$30 million dollars per month (\$360 million per year). So we must reduce expenses or increase revenue to maintain a healthy endowment fund. Our International officers will have some options for us to look at during the Convention in Denver later in the year.

Noble Troy Hanson, as the CSSS Band Association,

Music and molecular biology...what do they have in common? Shriner's Band and Rockefeller University...it takes Jerry Campbell to tie all these together.

Jerry was born in Meeker, Colorado in 1955 and was raised in Montrose until 3rd grade. His dad worked for the Soil Conservation Service and was working his way up the proverbial ladder so they moved to Springfield, Colorado. I asked if that wasn't like moving from the mountains to anthills and he told me Two Buttes was there, and they were larger than anthills...but not much.

In 4th grade it was obvious Jerry was bored with school and read constantly. He was tested by a psychologist who recommended he be immediately moved into a "good" school system so Dad took a pay cut and the family moved to Boulder. The school system suited the advanced Jerry and by junior high he was assisting a friend of his mother's, Professor Peter Kuempul, in the Colorado State University laboratory. He was studying molds and related things and found himself doing such advanced work that during summers while in high school he was in a paid position. The last summer of high school was spent studying chicken development (and a couple things I couldn't spell) with Professor Runner.

After graduation he attended college in Boulder where he was already known and graduated summa cum laude in 1977 with a double major in Chemistry and Molecular Cellular and Developmental Biology. There was no such thing as biochemical studies at that time. The necessary honors thesis was written under Dr. Tami Sueoka on "Characterizing a Single Growth Factor in Fetal Bovine Serum". Now, again, Jerry tried in 15 words or less to explain this to me and left me with that "deer in the headlights" look wondering what he was saying and I'm sure he was speaking English.

Now it was on to Rockefeller University, New York City, where he was granted a Pre-doctoral Fellow Award from the NSF (National Science Foundation), studied Molecular

Jerry Campbell's Band uniform.

Biology and obtained his PhD in 1983.

Now, back up to 1976, and go back to CSU. In a junior year biochem study session at a friend's house he met a girl named Sharon. They studied together, became friends, played racquetball, and eventually decided they really liked being together. When Jerry found he was definitely going to Rockefeller University the couple decided they wanted to be together and she made plans to move. With the exorbitant cost of housing (and for the ridiculous accommodations available) they made some phone calls and decided marriage was cheaper, so they got married and moved together. That was January 7, 1978 and it must have been a good decision as 33 years later they are still sharing their lives, their music and their housing.

While in junior high school, Jerry played alto saxophone and got a used one which he still owns. He also played baritone sax in the school stage band. All during his studies he loved music and played in concert band at CSU as well as the Marching Band. A road trip to the University of Nebraska at Lincoln gave one of his funnier memories when he and friends found a large sign on which they re-arranged the letters to read "CU Band" on one side and something less than flattering about

> the "Big Red" people on the other side. Now, in Nebraska that is just short of a felony but undoing the changed sign seemed to calm them and the competition went on unscathed.

> While in graduate school Jerry (and Sharon) were in a musical group, naturally. They were also in the New York University Concert Band at Rockefeller for 3 years and the New York Police Department Auxiliary Band. All this while he attended school and worked in the NYU Medical Center from 1983 to 1988.

> Moving in 1988 to St. Louis for his job, they joined the Merrimac Community Band and the O'Fallon Band until 1992 when they moved to Bucks County Pennsylvania with a biotech company. He was supposed to be there

for a 6 month stint and ended staying 8 years, and their bands were glad to have Jerry and Sharon. These included the Mercer Community Band (during the summers), the Tri-County Band, and Bucks County Community College Band.

At this time Jerry was forced to retire with a continuing illness and they moved back to Pueblo in 2001. Flight plans to come to Pueblo for house-hunting on September 12, 2001 were put on hold due to the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center the day before, however, they did manage to find a house and moved here in November.

Jerry had become a Mason in Fairless Hills, Bucks County Pennsylvania in 1996 but had not thought about the Shriners until 2004 when he found Al Kaly had a band. In 2006



Speaking of parades, the parade season is here! We have our first parade in May at Canon City. This is always a great parade and nice to see a large group of Nobles and ladies attend.



I have just returned from the Mid-Winter Business Meeting





Make your plans now to attend the 137th Imperial Session, scheduled for July 3-7, 2011, in the mile-high city of Denver. You do not want to miss it.

Denver – an amazing city – has activities and attractions for every interest, including the Colorado State Capitol – which is exactly one mile above sea level – the U.S. Mint, the LoDo Historic District, museums and gardens. In nearby Golden, Colo., popular sites include the Red Rocks Amphitheater, the Buffalo Bill Museum and Grave, and of course, Coors Brewery Tours.

The Denver area has a very diverse dining scene, offering everything from typical American comfort food to an apparently endless array of authentic ethnic choices. For those who like to tour new places on foot. Denver has been ranked as having the fourth most walkable downtown area in the nation. High school sophomore Nikolai Louritt began the school year as the team manager of the Cripple Creek-Victor football team in central Colorado. Nikolai soon realized he wasn't satisfied videotaping his friends - he wanted to join them on the field. Despite the fact the season was already underway and the team roster was set, Nikolai approached his coach.

"Coach, I want to play football," Todd Bowman recalls Nikolai telling him. "I said okay, but we're going to have to get you clearance."

It's hard to say which stunned the small community more; that the soft spoken teenager would want to play such a hard-hitting sport, or that as a double amputee he would want to play on prosthetic legs.

"I just like the sport," Nikolai explains. "It's aggressive and I'm an aggressive guy. It feels good to hit people."

Nikolai was born with defects that led to an above knee amputation on one leg and a Syme's amputation on the other. Prosthetist Eric Green is in charge of fitting and manufacturing Nikolai's limbs at Shriners Hospitals for Children®—Salt Lake City.

"The forces generated in falling and getting hit are not what any type of knee human or prosthetic—is designed for, but I say go for it!" exclaims Eric.



"He should be able to participate in whatever activity he wants. We'll adapt."

Nikolai received the go ahead to play the final three games of the season as long as he kept his prosthetic limbs padded. "Playing is a little bit harder for me," he says. "I can't run as fast, but I can hit hard. It's been a lot of fun."

The Cripple Creek-Victor Pioneers only celebrated one triumph during their eight game season, however the entire team walked away from their final game with something far more important than a winning record. Nikolai and his teammates learned having the heart of a champion is more important than being one.

Featured Shrine Club Arkansas Valley Shrine Club by Glenda Terrill


South Eastern Colorado Shrine Club has its beginning in Rocky Ford in 1947 under Potentate J. Lane Brown with W.E. Lapsley as President. In 1957 the Lamar area also began a Shrine Club and was then the most South Eastern unit so the name was moved to them and Rocky Ford became the Arkansas Valley Shrine Club under Potentate Alan Ladd. There were 30-35 members at the time, although, as with every other club and unit, that has fluctuated over time.

Manzanola, Swink, Rocky Ford, La Junta and Ordway contribute members to this club but at this time Ordway has no members active.

Until only a few years ago the club sponsored the Shrine Circus in Rocky Ford and donated to the Rocky Ford Pioneer Hospital, the La Junta Medical Center and Shriners Hospitals. They still host the Official Visit of the Potentate each year, a Christmas party and call special meetings for any necessary business during the year. 

The Band


Formed in 1922, The Band is the oldest and one of the most recognizable units in Al Kaly and sports a member who has been active about 55 years, Clyde "Bus" Hoyt. Bus has officially retired now, having performed last in January 2011 with his 100th birthday not far in the future.

The Band started out marching in the parades under the watchful eye of a drum major and progressed to a renovated school bus in the 1980's. The bus had the side windows removed to the frames and wooden "flaps" constructed with piano hinge bottoms. Enroute to the parades the flaps were secured in place and the members rode in the bus. On arrival the flaps were laid down exposing the interior and were then used in the parade to keep the members from having to walk. The bus was a great addition, but as with all things, lasted only a while. Without a means of transportation the band began to borrow trailers and pickups to get the members to the parades.

At this time Eldon Tedrow, an engineer by trade, drew up detailed plans for a workable trailer to use in the parades. Pueblo Community College welding class was contacted about completing the trailer using the plans with materials provided to them by the band and a class project was begun. The trailer we see today in the parades was the finished product and has been used for several years. PCC was donated several large tools for their help with this project and was grateful for the practice and the tools.

One band member remembers a Victor parade 12-15 years ago when 10 members and their instruments were stuffed into the back of a pickup truck so they could attend and take part.

Beginning with 120 members, the Band has

dwindled during the years to 35 members in 1983 and less than 10 in the late 1990's and early 2000's. In 2004, George Gollehon began a one-man project to build the band membership and succeeded in bring in 7-10 members earning him the honorary title of "father of the current band". As of 2011 we are doing well and going strong due to his dedication. Every unit can use new members, and woodwinds are specifically needed in the Band but they are doing well.

"Friends of the Band" also play with the band when appropriate and permissible by Shrine protocol. There are, at this time, 5-6 women who play under this title and are great additions when they are available.

The Band has performed in many, many parades, Western States (Shrine) Association and Central States Shrine Association meetings, Imperial meetings and other "gigs". April 2011 had 4 Band members playing in Lincoln, Nebraska at CSSA – a great showing for Al Kaly.

There are several "parts" of the Shrine Band. The original "whole" Band as we see it in parades, at stated meetings and ceremonials is the basic. We also have the Swinging Shriners, a dance band reminiscent of the "Big Band Era"; the German Ensemble and the Dixielanders. These "Sub-Bands" are available for individual "gigs" at no charge. They accept any donations and in turn donate this money to the Shrine Transportation Fund.

PUEBLO SHRINE ACCOMPLISHED UNUSUAL FEAT IN RESTORING OF BOUNDARY LINE

The following is an article from the Pueblo Chieftain, Tuesday, June 28, 1927. Thanks to Noble Grant Anderson and Mr. John Korber for submitting it.

The return to Pueblo of the delegates to the recent Shrine Conclave in Atlantic City has brought light to some unusual and rather striking details regarding the controversy which ended in restoring the boundary line between Al Kaly and El Jebel shrines.

Turned down by the report of the special committee which deals with questions of jurisdiction, then taking the controversy to the floor of the convention with Alva B. Adams, as spokesman and upsetting the committee recommendation by an almost unanimous vote such was the unique accomplishment of the local delegation. Incidentally, it has been nine years since such a vote has been secured on any proposition.

At the time of the establishment of Al Kaly Shrine in 1920, Al Kaly and El Jebel of Denver, were to have joint and concurrent jurisdiction in Colorado, this arrangement to extend over a period of three years.

In 1924 in Kansas City, Al Kaly Shrine through its delegates, presented its claim for a definite division line, representing that it was sufficiently well established to be entitled to a portion of the state which it could call its own. It requested the establishment of a line equidistant between Denver and Pueblo which should be the boundary line of an exclusive jurisdiction between the two shrines. This request was granted.

Representatives of Al Kaly and El Jebel met in Colorado Springs and agreed on the 39th parallel as the dividing line between the two jurisdictions. By this arrangement anyone from south of the line would join Al Kaly and those north of the line El Jebel. This ruling, however applied only to novices, and not to cases of affiliation.

At Philadelphia last year, due it is said, to special pleadings and influence brought to bear by devotees of the city of Denver, the dividing line was removed and the entire state again placed under concurrent jurisdiction of the two shrines, with the single exception of the counties in which the respective shrines were located.

The Pueblo delegation appealed to the Imperial Council again this year for a re-establishment of the boundary. After being turned down in the committee as related above, Alva B. Adams, as spokesman for the local delegation, performed the remarkable feat of winning over on the floor of the general meeting an indifferent and at the start unfriendly audience of 700 delegates, who voted almost unanimously to re-establish the division line thus giving Al Kaly Shrine exclusive jurisdiction over southern Colorado.

Al Kaly was represented by Senator Adams, Max Schwer, E.T. Shepherd and Charles E. Thomas.

Disability Awareness: Words Matter



Children with disabilities, like all children, will learn or absorb what they are taught and react to the way they are treated. Every staff member at Shriners Hospitals for Children works hard to build confidence and self-esteem in their patients, and to help them discover and pursue their dreams, despite their disabilities. In working with kids toward that goal, it's important to remember how language can affect a positive attitude.

Words to avoid include "crippled" and "handicapped." Instead of using these words, which can be considered negative, experts suggest using "disability" or the actual term involved, such as "cerebral palsy" or "muscular dystrophy."

When speaking about people with disabilities, clear, direct words are most positively accepted. For example, say, "Johnny uses a wheelchair," instead of, "Johnny is wheelchair-bound," or, "Johnny is confined to a wheelchair." Wheelchairs allow mobility from place to place, which is the opposite of confining.

Words and tone-of-voice can clearly indicate values, and using positive, affirmative words can make a big difference. Practice care when using value-laden words like *courageous*, *inspiration*, *pity*, *suffer*, *tragic*, *tragedy*, *afflicted* or *victim*. While *courageous* and *inspirational* may seem positive, being labeled as such can be burdensome to a child.

It is also important to use "people-first language." For example, saying, "Johnny is a *child with a disability*," is preferred over saying, "Johnny is a *disabled child*." People with disabilities sometimes feel isolated from those without disabilities and left out of activities. People-first language is an attempt to encourage understanding that people with disabilities are people first, and to help alleviate fear and encourage inclusion.

Conversation Starters

Here are some ways to start a conversation with a person who has a disability: Say hello; introduce yourself; comment on the weather. Find something you might share an interest in – television, music, sports, anything. In short, begin the same way you would if there were no disability. Take a deep breath, look past the obvious difference, and find the person.

When you speak to people with disabilities as people, you will find yourself in a conversation with someone who has had different experiences, and the exchange of views could be very enriching for both of you.

If you are interested in finding out more about the person's disability, understand that everyone with a disability reacts to this differently and, like most subjects, there are appropriate and inappropriate ways – and times and places – to ask such questions.

Try using words that reflect acceptance and indicate that a person is not defined by their disability – a message that is especially imperative to convey to children with disabilities.

Words and Phrases to Avoid:

Crippled, handicapped Confined to a wheelchair Wheelchair-bound Suffering from, afflicted with Victim Deformed

Instead, Try:

Person with a disability Person who uses a wheelchair Has (name of condition) Survivor




CLUB AND UNIT NEWS


